- Advocacy is:

- The power of collective voice: When we come together around a single cause, we amplify it
- Can I advocate?
 - Yes! You do not need to be an expert in policy to advocate, you are already an expert at what you do in this field

Power of Being a Constituent



- Connect your cause to something the Member cares about
 - They always want information that relates back to the district/state they represent
- Personal connections help you advance your agenda
 - It is very possible that your Member or staff is familiar with your school district/region and may even know you or people you work with
- Members will always be respectful
 - Even if you disagree on policy, your Representatives will be kind (*with very rare exception)

Effective Advocacy is:

- Educating Congress about CEC/CASE priorities
- Connecting policy priorities to a Member's home district or state
- Building relationships with Members and staff
- Establishing oneself as an expert on a specific topic and becoming a trusted resource





Pro Tips for Virtual Meetings: Wear professional attire Turn on your camera if you can

- Avoid outside distractions, i.e. the cat
- Treat the meeting as if it was in person





Building an Effective Case



- Illustrate a need
- Build a sense of urgency
- Tell a personal story that connects the issue to your district
- Make the "ask"
- Invite questions to further engage with your delegation

Working with Your State Team



- State leaders have all materials for requesting meetings
- State leaders serve as a resource
- Work with your state team to plan for your meeting



Pro Tips for Securing a Virtual Meeting:

- Defer to the office to use the platform they prefer
- Be sure to follow up–inboxes are overflowing





State Leaders Will Help You...



- Plan ahead of time:
 - Decide which "asks" to emphasize
 - Identify stories that support the "asks"
 - Assign speaking roles
- Review the agenda at the beginning of the meeting
- Introduce your team
- Actively facilitate to avoid awkward silences, people talking over each other, etc.
